FLASH FLOOD SAFETY GUIDE

BEFORE A FLASH FLOOD

- Know your risk: Review FEMA Flood Maps and local hazard maps to identify flood-prone areas.
- **Stay informed:** Sign up for Wireless Emergency Alerts (WEA), NOAA Weather Radio, and local alerts.
- **Prepare an emergency kit**: Include water, food, flashlight, batteries, charger, medications, documents, and first aid.
- Plan evacuation routes: Choose multiple routes and avoid low-lying areas or stream crossings.
- **Protect property:** Clear drains, elevate appliances, and consider sump pumps or backflow valves. Take photos inside and outside of your home in case of damage after the storm.

DURING A FLASH FLOOD

- Monitor official updates: Follow National Weather Service and local authorities.
- **Avoid floodwaters**: Six inches of moving water can knock you down; one foot can sweep away most vehicles.
- Move to higher ground: Do not wait for instructions if water is rising nearby! Even small creeks or ditches can swell rapidly during a flash flood.
- Avoid basements: Go to the highest accessible level, but avoid sealed attics without exits.
- **Turn Around, Don't Drown®:** Never attempt to drive through floodwater. Abandon the vehicle if necessary.
- Avoid bridges over fast-moving water: The structure may be unstable, and the water could rise suddenly.
- Stay away from downed power lines: Floodwaters can conduct electricity from damaged electrical systems.

IF YOU'RE SWEPT AWAY BY FLOODWATERS

- **Don't fight the current:** Try to float on your back, point your feet downstream, and look for a chance to grab onto something stable.
- Call for help loudly: Attract attention from rescuers or nearby people.
- Avoid debris: Keep clear of floating objects that could injure you.

AFTER A FLASH FLOOD

- Avoid contaminated water: Floodwaters may contain chemicals, sewage, and hidden hazards.
- **Document damage:** Take photos and videos before starting cleanup.
- Check utilities: Only restore gas or electricity after professional inspection.
- Dispose of contaminated items: Discard food, bottled water, and medicine exposed to floodwater.
- Protect your health: Wear gloves, boots, and masks during cleanup to avoid mold and contaminants.
